Meeting with Chorus

Jo from Chorus met with me in Morrinsville to provide an update on the plan of work in our district, specifically around Ultra Fast Broadband in Matamata and Morrinsville.

Chorus are presently in Matamata and almost completed and had programmed Morrinsville CBD to commence early in 2020. However they are well advanced in their timetable and their operational Manager recently advised Council staff that they were now committing to start work in the Morrinsville CBD in June/ July this year.
